Mano likes to sleep in, so I'm first up. Tatika helps me put on my stockings, a pair of corduroys and a sweater. I'm in kindergarten and Mano is in preschool. I tell her about my dreams. "We had a big house in the countryside and there were huge piles of leaves where we could jump and play!" Tatika laughs and says: "What a beautiful dream. How much do you think the house cost?" "A dollar!" Tatika laughs: "Let's buy a house after school then."

Mano wakes up. His gold chain has left a mark on his face while he sleeps. He doesn't say much, except that instead of arepas this morning he wants fruity pebbles. Tatika finishes dressing us up and brings us to the table for breakfast: Arepas con chocolate caliente.

He comes up for coffee before taking us to school. Tatika and Rocky talk in Spanish about La Familia, news from home, local elections and the remnants of the drug war. Their old lives hover over their new ones, even here in America. Mano and I grab our backpacks and head out to the car. Tatika sees us off and leaves a few minutes later.

In this moment, we are in Nueva York. New York City, the city of lights that Tatika and Rocky saw from airplane windows so long ago. The city of dreams where things work out the way you'd like them to. Where maybe, if you use your cacumen, you might be able to make it. In this moment, Tatika is walking to the train.

She loves the train noise. The sound of New York. Of home.

Now I don't know if you know this, but when the overhead 7 train passes over Jackson Heights you can scream in the middle of the street at the top of your lungs and no one can hear you or be bothered by it. Sometimes Tatika walks Mano and I through the neighborhood and when the train passes, we all stop right there in the middle of the street, holding hands and we yell at the top of our lungs and then we all burst out laughing. Tatika always thinks about doing it when she goes to work in the morning, but it wouldn't be as funny without Mano and me.

Tatika gets off the train and spends the day sewing labels onto jackets. At school, Mano and I split up to go to class. Rocky drives to the airport to pick up his first passenger of the day. We're all just living our lives in New York.

Thousands of miles away, Tatika's parents are having breakfast. Rocky's sisters are going to work and Ana prepares her famous sancocho. The long day passes, Rocky picks us up from school and Tatika waits for us kids to come home. When we finish eating dinner, Tatika calls la casa, hears the voice on the other end sending blessings from afar. She smiles, hangs up the phone, and calls out to Mano and me: "Let's go get empanadas." As we get to the bakery near the train station, a train passes overhead and....(Train noise)
